TEXAS OBJECTIVISM SOCIETIES CONFERENCE

The Texas Objectivism Societies Conference will be held the weekend of November 2-4 at the Marriott Brookhollow, located at 3000 North Loop West in Houston. The conference will begin Friday evening at 8 p.m. at the hotel with a reception/registration. Registration will continue at 8 a.m. on Saturday morning. Papers will be presented on Saturday and Sunday mornings beginning at 8:30 a.m., and workshops will be presented each afternoon. Various artists will display their work a number of times throughout the weekend, and attendees will entertainment on Saturday evening. conference will conclude at 4 p.m. on Sunday, November 4.

A small sampling of planned presentations follows:

<u>Papers</u>

For years the intellectual and moral collapse of socialism has been apparent to all but American university professors. In the past year, we have seen the derivative existential collapse of the Eastern bloc. As Ayn Rand said for years, the mind cannot be forced. Given the predicament of the Left, now unsupported in any way in theory or in practice, the ressurection of environmentalism is not surprising.

J. Brian Phillips tackles this ressurection with an examination of the philosophies of ecology. Brian finds that the Left's pretensions of being pro-man have been dropped, and they are now openly denouncing technology, civilization and mankind.

Ohad Kamin's paper on the decline of the Western movie also examines a long-term trend. A second paper may also be presented detailing the government's propagandistic use of art over the years.

Steve Rogers will examine different historical views of free will. Steve will also show how the acceptance of these views have affected societies.

Bob Gifford will look at the current state of the world in terms of the potential of Objectivism. Europe has given up trying to make the unworkable work. What will Europe do now, and what is America's view of the situation? It is clear that Objectivism has solutions, but what will it take to introduce Objectivism to Europe?

Workshops

"Beauty is in the eye of the beholder." This has long been the subjectivist bromide of art, particularly in music. Ayn Rand thought otherwise, but left to others the task of building a scientific approach to music. Anna Franco examines work done in the area of identifying objective elements in music.

Yaron Brook also focuses on art in his presentation of art slides accompanied by music.

The recent questioning of Judge Souter demonstrates how the use of language and premises in law are increasingly foreign to the layman. Attorney Michael Mazzone examines some current legal issues and explains the source of irrational legal doctrines.

The first window on our world is television and the print media. J. Brian Phillips compares coverage by different media of the same story in order to provoke caution on the part of the viewer and to provide techniques in getting the true picture.

Other possible topics for workshops include Objectivist epistemology, intellectual activism, the "animal's rights" movement, and modern physics.

Art

Among the artwork scheduled to be exhibited are sculpture by Revital Brook and Sam Adkisson, and paintings by Dorothy Meister and John Klingler.

Entertainment

Entertainment Night will feature a reading of an original play written by Anne Ciccollela. Michael Clover will read poetry by Robert Service and Rudyard Kipling. Chris Land will read "Kira's Viking" by Ayn Rand. Dean Shank will give a piano recital.

HOS MEMBERS PLAY DETECTIVE

On September 21 HOS members were treated to a murder mystery, served up by Dwyane Hicks, Anna Franco, Dawn Phillips and Brian Phillips. Warren Ross served as a moderator. The mystery was played out at the University of Houston Student Center.
